Essential Partners in Student Mental Health, Equity, and School Success
School social workers are uniquely trained mental health professionals who bridge home, school, and community to support students' social-emotional well-being and academic success—yet their role is often underutilized in school mental health conversations.

THE NEED FOR SCHOOL SOCIAL WORK

- School social workers address the social, emotional, and environmental barriers that impact learning.
- They support students facing challenges such as trauma, poverty, disability, discrimination, homelessness, and family stress.
- As youth mental health needs rise, school social workers are not a luxury—they are a lifeline.

WHAT SCHOOL LEADERSHIP CAN DO

- Include school social workers in leadership and strategic planning
- Ensure staffing ratios meet the 1:250 recommendation
- Recognize school social workers as essential mental health professionals
- Invest in equitable pay, retention, and sustainable staffing models

KEY IMPACT AREAS

Highly Qualified Mental Health Professionals

School social workers are licensed professionals with training in clinical practice, trauma-informed care, and culturally responsive interventions.

An Investment in Student Mental Health

School social workers improve attendance, academic outcomes, and school climate by reducing barriers to learning.

School Social Workers Transform School Communities

They address root causes of challenges and help build inclusive, safe, and equitable school environments.

Impact Beyond the Individual Student

Their work strengthens entire school systems through staff training, family engagement, and community partnerships.

School Social Workers and Special Education Success

School social workers enhance special education outcomes by supporting students' mental health, collaborating with IEP teams, and addressing barriers beyond the classroom that affect learning.

Advanced Practice with MSW Training

MSW-trained school social workers bring advanced expertise in assessment, intervention, crisis response, and case management.

The Right Ratio Matters

The recommended student-to-school social worker ratio is 1:250, yet many serve far more—limiting access to care.

Addressing the Pay & Retention Gap

Despite their qualifications, many school social workers face inequitable pay and benefits, impacting recruitment and retention.
